It will also serve as one of the blueprints against which all forthcoming State efforts to provide reparation to indicated victims may be measured.

How to fill out the survey

Most questions are framed as statements that can be either approved or rejected. In case of the latter, space is provided for stating an objection and an alternative formulation. If you feel that you don't know this area well enough to respond, Jiyan staff can provide sufficient background information to form an opinion.

Establish a comprehensive administrative program(s) aimed at providing reparations to survivors and other victims in line with international standards. Explanation Considering the scale of atrocities and the fact that individual perpetrators are often indigent, the prospects of victims obtaining compensation via criminal or civil proceedings are extremely limited. On top of this, a rather weak judiciary would be unlikely to be capable of processing the large amount of claims that are to be submitted. Victims should remain entitled to pursue reparations through judicial avenues, criminal or civil, if otherwise not explicitly indicated. Claims for compensation under relevant civil, criminal or administrative procedures should not be subject to statutes of limitation. Explanation Courts are critical for setting standards of legal obligation, and victims and their advocates should not ignore their strategic value. Pursuing individual cases through the courts tends to be a very incomplete way of addressing the scale of the challenge represented by the victims in post-conflict settings. Courts only have the capacity to attend to a limited number of cases. Victims may be required to present detailed proofs of the violation, of the injuries incurred, and sometimes even of the identity of the perpetrator. Those victims without resources or access to legal counsel and courts – though equally harmed – often go without redress. The focus here, is on reparations programs that are created by legislation for whole classes of victims. Victims are all civilians that directly suffered gross human rights violations at the hands of all parties to the ISIS conflict in Iraq (2012-2018). All victims should be allowed access to reparations. For the purpose of accessing benefits provided in the reparation program, relatives of victims who are deceased or missing (the so-called indirect victims) should be considered victims as well. Children forcibly recruited to armed groups will be considered eligible. Explanation Benefits of any reparations program are limited to victims of gross violations of human rights and victims of serious violations of the laws of war. This is found in the UN's Basic Principles and Guidelines on Reparations. Prospective reparation schemes should include civilian victims only (both primary and secondary). Considering that families of soldiers who died or suffered injuries in combat are being compensated through other legislation, they should not be included in the current reparation program. Although taking on combating roles under coercion, child soldiers were primarily victims and should be covered by an administrative reparation program. In lack of consistent internationally recognized definition of gross human rights violations, the present paper will consider gross human rights violations the following violations as well as the violations of comparable gravity: Genocide; Summary or arbitrary killing; Enforced Disappearances; Slavery and the slave trade; Prolonged and arbitrary detention; Use of child soldiers; Torture or cruel, inhuman, or degrading treatment or punishment; Crimes against Humanity (defined in the 1998 Rome Statute of the International Criminal Court); Apartheid and systematic racial and religious discrimination; Conflict-Related Sexual Violence (CRSV) (rape, sexual slavery, forced prostitution, forced pregnancy, enforced sterilization, or any other form of sexual violence of comparable gravity). Explanation

Guarantees of non-repetition, which focus on the prevention of future violations, are crucial to providing assurance to victims who may fear retaliation or future harm. Given the seriousness of the harms inflicted on victims of conflict-related sexual violence, the combination and interplay of different forms of reparation appears necessary. Transformative reparations are measures that have the potential not only to deliver benefits to victims but also help overcome structures of inequality and discrimination. Pursuing a transformative approach to reparations as to conflict-related sexual violence would entail preferring modes of reparations capable of changing the imbalance of power detrimental for women in present-day Iraq.
